

CFAC hosted an inaugural US/Central European Academic Collaboration Symposium on November 11 and 12 at the Main Campus Student Center and academic units across campus. Scholars from Jagiellonian University, the State University of Applied Sciences in Krosno, Jan Matejko Academy of Fine Arts in Kraków, the Academy of Arts and Culture in Osijek, the University of Kentucky, and East Carolina University participated in this symposium. Themed "Intersect: Culture, Art, and Science," the symposium delved into the rich intersections of creative expression, scientific inquiry, and cultural development through a plenary panel discussion and discipline-based breakout sessions. The symposium was accompanied by two exhibitions of artwork and historical documents from the Jan Matejko Academy of Fine Arts, Jagiellonian University, and the State University of Applied Sciences in Krosno.




The result is temporary artwork and an eco-conscious alternative to traditional street art.

Emanuel Gruber's new recording, Brahms: Cello Sonatas was released on Bridge Records this fall.





"Dear Listener,

For the last 150 years cellists have learned and performed the cello sonatas of Johannes Brahms. These sonatas became part of the core cello repertoire along with Bach Cello Suites and Beethoven Sonatas and Variations. When recording became available, cellists, starting with Pablo Casals, recorded them and inspired us to follow in their steps.

It was my dream that one day I will also record them. I am happy that now I can join my teachers, Piatigorsky and Starker to present my interpretation of these masterfully written works.

These sonatas, E Minor and F Major, were written 20 years apart. They are different from one another while offering a wide range variety of emotional content. The Adagio from the Sonata Op 78 is dark in mood and expresses profound grief after death of Schumann's son.

I love this music and hope that listening to my recording gives you artistic pleasure and inspires you to love Brahms as much as I do.

CFAC Updates

CFAC Colleagues,

As we move into November and start to wind down another semester, I hope everyone is looking forward to spending time with friends and family over the Thanksgiving and Winter breaks. This is also the time of year when we start many of our personnel actions, including reappointment and subsequent appointment procedures, preparing materials for Annual Evaluations, and starting this spring semester, entering Faculty Workplans for all fixed-term, tenure-track, and tenured faculty.

We will once again utilize Faculty180 to enter activities, generate yearly reports, share evaluations, and indicate percentages and goals for Faculty Workplans. For our new faculty, please know that you have the ability to access Faculty180 at any time to enter activities from this summer and fall. Please refer to "Faculty180 Instructions" which is permanently located on the CFAC website at: https://artscomm.ecu.edu/links-and-information/ for information and guidance on how to navigate Faculty180. Additionally, the Office of Faculty Excellence provides a number of resources related to all personnel actions. Please visit: https://ofe.ecu.edu/tosee the entire list of workshops and trainings that are available.

Regarding Faculty Workplans, all four schools are currently finalizing workload plans for implementation during the spring semester. The Office of Faculty Excellence has also built into Faculty180 the process for how faculty will enter and administrators will view Faculty Workplans. While at the time of this newsletter, faculty are not required to enter percentages and goals into Faculty180, please know this process must be completed by January 1st, 2025. As we approach this deadline, there will be workshops/trainings related to the Faculty Workplan process. However, I would like to include two documents that will provide everyone with instructions for how percentages and goals will be entered into Faculty180 moving forward. For information regarding how to enter percentages, please refer to: *How to Enter Activity Distribution/Weights*, and for instructions on how to enter goals, please refer to: *How to Enter Annual Faculty Workplan Goals*. You will also notice that I have intentionally used the word "percentages" as opposed to "weights," while the instructions still refer to the term "weight." Please know these documents are currently being updated to eliminate the term "weight" as we transition to the new Faculty Workplan policy in which faculty will notate their percentages and goals for each academic year.

Thank you for your patience as we figure out how to navigate this new system policy. Your Unit Administrators will be sharing instructions for how to complete required items in December and throughout the spring semester. And as always, please reach out to me if I can assist with answering any questions or navigating this process in Faculty180.

During the "13th Biennial International Conference on Music since 1900" held at KU Leuven, Belgium, September 13–15, 2024, Navid Bargrizan, Assistant Professor of Musicology at the ECU School of Music, presented his research Project titled "Luigi Nono's La Fabbrica Illuminata and its Controversial Politics." This presentation was part of the panel "Nono Centenary." Bargrizan also chaired the panel "Compositional Research" at this conference (https://www.musicsince1900.org/).

On Saturday, October 12, 2024, the ECU School of Music hosted the Fall 2024 meeting of the American Musicological Society Southeast Chapter, organized by Navid Bargrizan, Assistant Professor of Musicology. This meeting included opening remarks by Christopher Ulffers, Director of the ECU School of Music; research presentations by guest scholars and Cameron Stevenson, Lecturer of Music at ECU; a keynote speech titled "Decoding the Archive: Heitor Villa-Lobos's Symphony No. 10 'Amerindia,' Ethnography, Histories, and National Narrative" by Silvio dos Santos, Professor and Coordinator of Musicology and Ethnomusicology Program at the University of Florida; and a performance of Charles Ives's Calcium Light Night by the ECU Symphonic Wind Ensemble, conducted by William Staub.

Derek Myler, Assistant Professor of Music Theory, was invited to participate in the sesquicentennial festival "Charles Ives at 150: Music, Imagination, and American Culture," held from September 30 to October 8 at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music, and supported in part by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The festival was the largest such anniversary event celebrating Ives's 150th year anywhere in the world, bringing together performances by internationally renowned artists and scholars in the disciplines of musicology, music theory, art history, comparative literature, American history, and English. Dr. Myler's participation was made possible through the Music Theory Five Friends Master Class Series honoring Robert Samels. While in residency at the festival, he was invited to give two public lectures and one concert talk, participate in three interdisciplinary panels, and provide guest teaching in the undergraduate classroom.





<u>Phi Kappa Phi</u> hosted a pop-up presentation, *Masking Reality: The Impact of AI on Truth and Democracy*, on October 16th in Sci-tech C309. Moderated by <u>Brian Massey</u>, a professor of journalism in the School of Communication, the panelists included:

- <u>Drew T. Ashby-King</u>, an assistant professor in the School of Communication, on how generative AI tools have been discussed within the popular press and the tools possible uses in strategic communication including campaign messaging.
- o <u>Armin Krishnan</u>, Security Studies director and associated professor in Political Science on the possibility of foreign governments interfering with the election, using Al and deep fakes.
- Rachel Son, an assistant professor in the School of Communication, on the role of deepfakes/AI in terms of how we
 perceive source or message credibility/authenticity and how AI can be connected to misinformation/disinformation
 shared on social media about politics and/or elections.

The topic focused on the complex world of AI—focusing on media, misinformation, and the potential influence on elections. This panel discussed how technologies are reshaping decision-making and our political landscape and what could be done to safeguard the "truth" in the digital age. Discover insights into the threats posed by AI-generated content and discuss potential solutions to combat misinformation.



Three Textile Design Students were juried into the <u>Spotlight on Student Fiber Trends 2024</u>: Paul Edwards, Rachael Lowman, and Eliza Winslow at the Mary Cornwell Gallery, Haywood Community College, Clyde, NC. "This juried exhibition highlighted the creativity and skill of post-secondary students and featured a diverse range of works demonstrating both originality and technical prowess.

Robin Haller's one-person exhibition, <u>Being Present</u>, was featured at the Emily Monk Davidson Gallery, Farmville, NC. This show included work that explores memory, time, and translations of human experience.



<u>Kate Wheeler</u> ('22 MAEd) published her research, A Mixed Methods Critical Review of the A+ Schools in NC: Making a Case for Fidelity in Frameworks, through the online <u>Journal for Learning Through the Arts</u>.

Quantitative findings from NC school report cards comparing 37 arts-integration public K-8 schools in North Carolina (NC) called "A+ Schools" with 37 traditional public K-8 NC schools revealed that the majority of NC A+ schools averaged lower EOG scores than the schools in their district. In this data sample, both A+ Schools and traditional schools' scores in NC had a downward trajectory since 2001. Additional findings included increased arts classes offered at A+ schools and slightly decreased chronic absenteeism compared to traditional public schools. This data was triangulated with a qualitative analysis of three interviews: with the NC A+ Schools program director, with an arts director at an A+ school, and with a principal at an A+ school. Challenges to implementation within the NC A+ program are discussed as well as methods of preparation and practice that link these two high-performing schools to four highly acclaimed arts-integrated school programs. A five-part framework for arts-integrated schools is recommended: (1) the use of data-driven planning, (2) garnering funds, (3) collaboration between arts educators, arts specialists and classroom teachers, (4) ongoing professional development (PD), and (5) showcases of student work.

We recently hosted two meaningful events that celebrated our students and honored the families and donors who support their success at CFAC.

During Family Weekend, Dean Kean welcomed our first-year and transfer students, along with their loved ones, to our annual CFAC Family Brunch at the beautiful Wellington B. Gray Gallery (thank you, SoAD!). The event was surrounded by the impressive artwork created by our ECU Art+Design students, making it a truly special occasion.

In November, we hosted the CFAC Scholarship and Donor Recognition Luncheon, where scholarship recipients and donors came together to celebrate student achievements and express our gratitude for the generous gifts that make these scholarship programs possible. Dr. Bonnie Mani delivered an inspiring talk, sharing her journey as a student, professional, educator, and donor. We also had the honor of recognizing Harvey Wooten, a longtime supporter of CFAC, and presented her with a special acknowledgment for her contributions to the Donor Gifts Program, which she has helped fund in recent years.
